Strawberry Fest Boasts Variety

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The strawberries are imported, but almost everything else is home-grown, including the music, at LaSalle's annual Strawberry Festival.

The 18th annual festival, held Friday through Sunday at LaSalle's Gil Maure Park on Front Road, will include fireworks on Friday, a carnival throughout the weekend, music Friday and Saturday, and children's entertainment all day Saturday and Sunday.

Several free events highlight this year's festival:

Windsor's popular Kiss tribute band, Destroyer, performs Friday before the fireworks.

YTV's fun-filled van, Weird on Wheels, offers games, laser tag, and other attractions for kids all day Saturday and Sunday.

Canadian rockers Thornley perform a free outdoor concert at the main stage Saturday, with special guests, Windsor's Ashes of Soma.

Clifford the Big Red Dog entertains preschoolers and poses for pictures all day Sunday.

The ever-popular carnival operates throughout the festival, Friday to Sunday.

Spokesman Jeff Renaud said this year's entertainment has been scaled back from last year's unexpectedly large turnout for Finger Eleven.

"Last year, just before finger Eleven played here, their song, One Thing, his U.S. radio and they were suddenly huge," Renaud said. "It was good for us, but it did put some strain on the community."

It was too much of a good thing. The estimated crowd of 10,500 on the Saturday night jammed Gil Maure Park and forced closure of several streets in the area.

The town was dinged to the tune of about \$10,000 in extra policing.

Renaud doubts Thornley will draw those kinds of numbers, although he is banking on the band's profile with older teenagers and college-age adults.
